Robyn Lawrence

Dr Robyn Lawrence is the Chief Executive of the Department for Health and Wellbeing. She is responsible to the Minister for Health and Wellbeing for the governance, leadership and management of the South Australian health system. This includes being the direct employer of more than 45,000 staff and managing a budget of \$7.4 billion.

Robyn has more than 16 years' experience as a senior health care executive in predominantly change roles. She has led many transition projects, including capital

developments and commissioning, cultural reform and governance changes. Robyn has also led the WA COVID-19 response as Deputy Chief Health Officer and Incident Controller and has a medical background and a strong focus on clinical governance and excellence in her previous role as Assistant Director General with the WA Department of Health.



Lucas Semmler

Lucas Semmler is the Executive Director of SA Pathology and has a career within SA Pathology spanning 22 years. Lucas a Board Director for both Public Pathology Australia (PPA) and Pathology Awareness Australia (PAA), and a National Association Testing Authorities (NATA) Technical Assessor.

Lucas began his career as a Medical Scientist in Whyalla and has managed multi-discipline teams within the SA Pathology regional network. He has been the Directorate Manager of both Automated Laboratories and Regional Services, and the Business Lead for the EPLIS

Optimisation Project. As the Director of SA Pathology Reform, Lucas led the refinement of the organisation's business delivery model to deliver significant savings and established a future pathway for public pathology in South Australia through the participation and leadership in the development of the 2020-2023 SA Pathology Strategic Plan.

As the Director of Pathology Operations, Lucas played a key role in driving further organisational structural reform and delivery on initiatives through established annual business planning cycles.



Rob Elliott

Rob Elliot is the Chief Executive Officer for the SA Ambulance Service and began his career in the organisation over 30 years ago. He is a Fellow of the Australasian College of Paramedicine and was honoured with the Ambulance Service Medal in 2014.



Jeremy is currently Medical Co-Director (Women, Children and Youth) at Royal Darwin Hospital and has a passion for ensuring access to health services for the most vulnerable in our communities and designing systems to increase health equity. His work in reforming sexual and reproductive health law and policy includes a period as Technical Consultant for WHO Laos, focusing on Maternal Death Surveillance and Response,

Emergency Obstetric Care and the Prevention of Unsafe Abortion.

Jeremy is the Chair of the NT Perinatal and Maternal Mortality Committee and has been a key collaborator in the development of the NT Health Operating Cost Model, Clinical Services Capability Framework and Clinical Services Plan. He is also directly involved in workforce development, both for specialty workforce training programs, and in the strategic planning and execution of a medical education program for the NT through Charles Darwin University. Jeremy has also collaborated with the Menzies School of Health Research in the development of the cultural safety program Ask the Specialist Plus.



Claire Madden

Claire Madden is a leading voice internationally on Generation Z. As an author, social researcher, keynote speaker, and media commentator, Claire is in high demand as an expert in interpreting social trends, demographics, and implications of generational change. Claire is the author of Hello Gen Z: Engaging the Generation of Post-Millennials.

Claire is highly regarded for her dynamic and engaging presentations where she translates robust, research-based content into strategic applications for educators, managers, and business leaders. Claire is commissioned by some of the nation's largest companies and
